Protecting Our Drinking Water

In 1840 most people obtained water from the Rio Grande River. They often went by donkey to gather it in buckets or barrels. At that time the water was clear and could be drunk without the worry of pollution.

Today our water has been contaminated and needs to be cleaned before we drink it directly from the Rio Grande River. The Unit on Daily Life describes what can contaminate our drinking water. We should make every effort to avoid these so we do not further harm our drinking water.
